**SHYNIIE LU** Currently a senior in high school at Sonoma Academy in Santa Rosa Academically, she has a love for both the STEM field and English. Producer of “Strong Survival” a Student Documentary Film on Human Trafficking documenting a human trafficking activist and survivor’s experiences as a trafficked youth from Sonoma County. Shynie volunteers at the University of California San Francisco Medical Center, works on the American Red Cross Northern California Board of Directors, and is the Chair of the Sonoma County Junior Commission on Human Rights. She is particularly passionate about medicine and human rights and has plans to become an anesthesiologist.



**KULVINDAR RANI SINGH** Assistant District Attorney, San Francisco DA’s Office, Recipient of 2017 Modern Day Abolitionist Award by San Francisco Coalition on Human Trafficking, Managing Attorney of the Collaborative Courts

Rani has been a prosecutor for almost 18 years. Her career has focused on working with vulnerable populations, and she has dedicated much of time as an assistant district attorney to working with victims of sexual assault and domestic violence. Human trafficking work became her focus when she joined the sexual assault team in 2015 and embarked on a complex human trafficking case with underage victims. Her work on the Geeter case marked a turn in the tide for prosecution of cases of sexual exploitation. After an almost year of preparation and a three-month trial, the defendant received 97 years to life after being convicted of human trafficking of two minors as well as various other charges.



**JUDGE MARIANNA WARMEE** Federal Administrative Judge and member of the US Equal Employment Opportunity Commission

Judge Warmee has worked as a federal administrative judge for nearly 20 years. Her agency, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, investigates and pursues labor trafficking operations. She is a founding member of Freedom House shelter in San Mateo County, the first shelter for victims of human trafficking in Northern California. She has been working directly with trafficking survivors since 2010. For four years, Judge Warmee was an instructor responsible for training law enforcement officers throughout the state how to successfully investigate human trafficking crimes.
